Daniel 9:1-2 (NASB) Notes

- ⇒ In Daniel's day, the hope of the Jews was returning to their homeland. What is the hope of Christians today?
- We must pay attention to biblical prophecy because it is the light of certainty in a world of darkness and uncertainty. Cf., 2Pe.1:19-21
- \Rightarrow A word that we have not yet seen in the book of Daniel appears 8 times in the first 20 verses ... what is the word? ... what is significant about this word?
- LORD (Jehovah) used 8x in this chapter (only this chapter in Daniel) vv. 2, 4, 8, 10, 13,14(2), 20. This is God's covenant name (Ex.6:2-8). Daniel is praying on behalf of God's covenant people.
- ¹ In the first year of Darius the son of Ahasuerus, of Median descent, who was made king over the kingdom of the Chaldeans –
- ⇒ Right after the fall of Babylon to the Medes & Persians (9:1-2), what did Daniel do? Where do you turn in the midst of crisis or transition?
- 539/538 B.C. about 12 years after Daniel's second vision in chapter 8. He is about 81 years old.
- "Ahasuerus" is the Hebrew derivative of a Persian title [Greek = Xerxes] for king. Not the same person as the king mentioned in the book of Esther.
- ² in the first year of his reign, I, Daniel, observed in the books the number of the years which was revealed as **the word of the LORD** to **Jeremiah** the prophet for the completion of the desolations of Jerusalem, namely, seventy years.
- ⇒ How does v. 2 support the verbal inspiration of Scripture taught by the Apostle Paul in 2 Timothy 3:16?
- Daniel took prophecy literally. Cf., Jer.25:1-14 (605 BC) and 29:1,10-14.
- The first copy of these scrolls had been destroyed (*Jer.36*), but God had them copied again in order to preserve them for Daniel. Cf., *Ps.119:152*; *Isa.40:8*; *Mt.24:35*.
- Why were the Israelites exiled? Cf., Lev.25:1-12, 18-22 Sabbath rest and the Year of Jubilee were good for the land and good for the spiritual life of God's people. But the people rebelled (2Chron36:15-21 then 22-23). Timing theories: Either 606/605 BC (beginning of siege) to 537/536 BC (50,000 Jews return, Ezra 1-2) Or, 586 BC (Temple destroyed) to 515 BC (2nd Temple built & dedicated).
